VICE-PRESIDENT AND DIRECTOR OF COM-MUNITY OUTREACH AND EDUCATION Laurie Brooks continues to set up meetings for the Florida

Keys Native Plant ID class with Jim Duquesnel. The next class will be January 18 from 5:30 to 7:00 PM with Duane Kolterman.

Laurie continues to participate in the Workdays for the REEF gardens, as well as the workdays for the clubhouse gardens. The next workday will be January 16 (3rd Sunday of the month) from 10 to 11 AM, followed by a workday session at GCUK from 11 AM to noon.

Laurie also continues to support the Ocean Studies Charter School's gardens and is currently working on a committee to create an outdoor classroom (trails, kiosks and signage) for the Hammock. The eco-environment planter gardens in front of school are doing well as is the water garden in back. She and other Ocean Studies Charter School representatives have met with Monroe County on December 17 to determine what the school can do on its property.

The Master Gardener Plant Clinics continue to be held at our clubhouse on the third Wednesday of the month. The next one will be January 19. Plant of the Month Snowberry (Chiococca alba) by Charlene Regenhardt

If you walk along the gravel drive behind the clubhouse at the western edge of our club property, you may notice some shrubs intermixed with Spanish bayonettes. This time of the year the shrub is rather unimpressive but the blooms, followed by pea-sized white berries later in the spring and summer, are sure to be noticed!

What stands out most about snowberry are the flowers and the white berries that inspire the plant's name. The flowers form large clusters called racemes that can be spectacular. The blooms are followed by small berries that are pure white. Among the lengthy list of other common names are milkberry, West Indian milkberry, West Indian snowberry, David's milkberry, David's root, cahinka and cahinka root. It is a member of Rubiaceae, the coffee family.

Snowberry is a large clambering vinelike shrub with 4angled branches forming a large mound or climbing high into other vegetation. It usually grows between six and 10 feet tall but can reach 25 feet under the right conditions with something to grow on for support.

There are three species commonly called Snowberry; *Chiococca alba*, is the most common. It is native to the Florida Keys north mostly along the coasts to Duval and Dixie counties; Bermuda, West Indies, Texas, Mexico, Central America and South America. It occurs naturally in pine rocklands, shell mounds and coastal strands and hammocks, and prefers partial shade and moist soils.

The bark is yellowish-gray, marked by deposits of cork. The leaves are bright green, oval shaped, two to four inches long and arranged oppositely. They may be elliptic, ovate, or broadly lanceolate in shape.

When in bloom, the creamy fragrant flowers attract butterflies. The flowers are small (up to $\frac{1}{2}$ "), five-lobed and bell-shaped. The white fruit hang in clusters and are very attractive to birds in late summer. They are not poisonous or tasty.

In traditional herbal medicine, snowberry has been used to treat rheumatism and snakebites. It's also been used to treat asthma, coughs and diarrhea and as a laxative, diuretic and to induce vomiting. The active ingredient in snowberry apparently is methyl-salicylate, a substance the plant produces when attacked by leave-eating insects. The substance attracts carnivorous insects who then eat the bugs attacking the plant. Methyl-salicylate



is used in perfumes, in foods to provide fragrance and in liniments. It's also toxic, deadly if taken in sufficient quantities. The root, particularly root bark, is the part of the plant that was used medicinally.

Some internet sources report snowberry as a host plant for the Miami blue butterfly. I checked with an expert at FSU who told me there was an anecdotal observation of the butterfly depositing eggs on the plant in the 1970s but the Daniels Lab, which specializes in Miami blue research, does not recognize snowberry as a host plant.

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Cultivation Data

Habitats: Hammocks and thickets.

Soils: Moist, well-drained sandy or limestone soils, with humusy top layer.

Nutritional Requirements: Moderate; can grow in nutrient poor soils, but needs some organic content to thrive.

Salt Water Tolerance: Low; does not tolerate long-term flooding by salt or brackish water.

Salt Wind Tolerance: High; can tolerate moderate amounts of salt wind without injury.

Drought Tolerance: Moderate; generally requires moist soils, but tolerant of short periods of drought once established.

Light Requirements: Light shade.

Flower Color: Generally yellow, sometimes white or peach.

Flower Characteristics: Semi-showy bell-shaped flowers in two-ranked rows. Fragrant.

Flowering Season: All year; peak spring-summer.

Fruit: Clusters of attractive white, drupelike berries.

Wildlife and Ecology: Provides significant food and cover for wildlife. Nectar plant for julia (*Dryas iulia*) and other butterflies.
